

Operator Controlled Air Shocks



Here is a view of a late engine compartment. Notice up in the air intake compartment that there are some extra pieces. They constitute an Air Shock control system comprised of a Tee to feed two shocks with the same air – pretty standard air shock stuff, right? There's a little air compressor to pump them up, and a pressure sensor to read the pressure and send the info to a Dash mounted Gauge and a Solenoid to let air out of the shock's air-bag when it's time to lower the pressure. All of this sits in a row of devices up on that shelf, which could easily be put in the 'frunk', all except the Tee.

At the Dash are the control switches for raising and lowering the air pressure as well as the display telling us what is, the pressure. A very important part of this scheme is that it tells us that "YES', there is <u>some</u> necessary pressure; as an air shock will be readily killed if you drive the vehicle with no pressure in the air bag - by the internal rubbing of its parts, which normally don't touch each other. So, the gauge tells you there is pressure and, it also tells you how much. For those who drive at night it will be helpful to determine the correct headlight aiming for a specific pressure, so that should be noted. Higher pressure adds to this air-spring making the rear suspension firmer, as well as taller. The shock is unaffected by the pressure in the air-bag.

Bulb Grease

This seems to be against the rules, for most of us, but when we see our very OLD cars with corroded connections it starts to make sense.

First off DO NOT grease the bulbs! Greased bulbs are hard to push/turn for either install or remove so let's get that clear. What you need to do is to grease the contacts / the base of the bulb and inside of the socket.


This also goes for the very infamous umbilical connector - back there by the regulator on the EM and LM and on the truck's firewall.


It's too easy to squirt solvent in those connectors when we are cleaning the engine compartment - but if you do that, then after all the cleaning is done, you have to go back and re-lube that big guy in the corner.

In some cases, an oil can would do the job, nevertheless those brass fingers get eaten up by the environment leaving you with blinking lights, poor connections, stuck bulbs and even fires!

So, a word to the wise: now that you have a little free COVID time, take out all your bulbs - YES, you'll have to open those closed-in little chambers behind the lenses, etc. and kick out the spiders. Lube those screws too!

Let's remember to have fun while we **Keep On CORVAIRing**, **Fram**








I took apart a small air compressor the other day and was amazed at what I found.

Intake and exhaust valves were in the head. The head was held down with long threaded rods past the cylinder into the block.

The individual cylinder was sealed into the head with a removable head gasket.



I was struck by the similarity to our favorite CORVAIR design.

Proposed amendments to the CMI Bylaws

Included with this newsletter is a proposed set of Bylaws for CMI. This proposal adapts concepts from both previous proposals. The major new feature is composition of the Board of Directors. This proposal calls for 7 Directors, elected for 2-year staggered terms. The Directors will be the 4 officers we have today, an Activities Director, and 2 at-large Directors. We will be voting for approval of this proposal at our next regular meeting with an agenda item as described below. If you have any questions or comments on this proposal, contact any CMI officer or the Bylaws committee (Peter Schmit, Jim Becker).

The following amendments are recommended for approval by the 3.0 special committee on bylaws:

"Corvair Minnesota Incorporated" was organized and incorporated by the State of Minnesota on the 27th of November 1978, under the name "North Central Corvair Association." Thereafter, in March 1991, the Association was allowed by the Minnesota Secretary of State to change its name to "Corvair Minnesota Incorporated" (CMI).

The Articles of Incorporation of North Central Corvair Association (later CMI) provide for the adoption of bylaws to conduct the affairs of the corporation.

THEREFORE, the membership of CMI adopts the following:

AMENDMENTS TO CMI BYLAWS

These Bylaws rescind and replace all existing bylaws of Corvair Minnesota Incorporated.
