# Hillel F. Sweet



Hill lived a long, joyful, energetic and productive life, full of fun experiences. He was born on October 7, 1927, in Minneapolis, MN. He graduated from University High in 1946 where he was a Minnesota state high school wrestling champion. After graduating, he served in the Army in Japan from 1946-1948. Hill married the love of his life, Arlene Kaufman, on November 20, 1949, and spent the next 71 years with her. He created a successful business called Minnesota Auto Parts and had a great passion for antique cars and motorcycles. He was renowned for his restoration skills and antique motorcycle collection, and he was a long-time member of Corvair Minnesota and charter member of the Viking Chapter of the Antique Motorcycle Club. Hill loved being at his cabin, fishing, hunting, training prize-winning hunting dogs, and he was an avid reader of history. Hill was an inventor with multiple patents, known for his innovative ideas and mechanical talents. He was a kind man of few words who made friends wherever he went. He showed his love through actions and whenever his family told him they loved him, he would say "It goes without saying." His grandchildren were the delight of Hill's life. Preceded by parents, Harry and Ida Sweet; siblings, Douglas, Jack and Conrad Sweet and their wives Elaine and Annette; in-laws, Dr. Jerry and Pauline Kaufman, Annette and Burt Davidson, and Hal Divine; and uncountable friends. # ValveTrainGeometry - Instead of a Tech Session!

(let's start with a sketch)



They forgot to draw the engine oil hole into the little piston.

Nice drawing.



I drew this and then found a nicer pair of sketches in the '61 manual.

When the cam pushes on the lifter, it also pushes on the oil inside, which pushes on the little piston (the one with the dimple).

This little piston, in turn, lifts the Pushrod to pivot the RockerArm and open the valve.

The engine's oil pressure keeps the little piston up against the PushRod so there is no clearance in the ValveTrain. When there is no clearance there is also no "clack" in the ValveTrain. That's how come they invented Hydraulic lifters!



As the engine warms up, its Aluminum parts get twice as big as its Iron parts do, and the PushRod needs to follow those changes, so the little piston moves around in the lifter - always maintaining the Zero lash – quietly.

When we set up our ValveTrain we usually start with the little piston in the middle of its travel. We do that because if the little piston were at the top of its travel, the ValveTrain would 'clack' and the valves wouldn't open all the way. If the little piston were at the bottom of its travel, the valves wouldn't close, and your engine would talk back to you – using bad language – and you might burn a valve!

To adjust the position of the little piston, inside of the lifter, we use the BallNut up in the RockerArm – two turns of this nut is all we get...from solid Lifter to Zero lash.

The BallNut is on a 24 threads per inch bolt. So, two turns is about 80 mils and since the BallNut is about a third of the way across the RockerArm, we are seeing about 125 mils of range, for the little piston.  $\sim 1/8$ "

Here's where ValveTrainGeometry comes in:


In the last 60 years our engines have been opened up a few times and usually by someone else! So, we don't know what has been done to it or in it. Newly machined head gasket surfaces, a new cam and lifters, or a reground cam (!) and after market lifters, fregzample, send our PushRods up/down and everything must move to accommodate their new positions. An easy way to realign these dimensons is to read the needed length of the

PushRod. If it is not within specs (see photo right), where the condition shown is when the valve is halfway open, new Pushrods can be made, for a reasonable charge, in increments of 0.025"(25 mils) to put your Geometry back in the right dimension. The engine in my FC has PushRods shortened by 75 mils.

But! you don't know what that number is, until you read your ValveTrainGeometry! So, watch the video!

# Warren Eugene LeVeque

November 7, 1941 - November 29, 2020

FAYETTEVILLE, Tenn. - It is with regret we announce the passing of Mr. Warren Eugene LeVeque, 79, of Fayetteville, Tennessee, formerly of Anderson. Warren was born in Linton to the late Eugene "Red" and Lurinda "Rindy" Glass LeVeque. He passed away on Nov. 29, 2020, at Lincoln Medical Center in Fayetteville, Tennessee.

Warren attended the Prospect Baptist Church in Fayetteville and formerly attended Grace Baptist Church in Anderson, where he was very involved for 20 years with the Keenagers program. He attended the General Motors Institute of Technology in Flint, Michigan, where he met his wife. Warren worked and retired as an industrial electrician with General Motors in Indiana.

He was also the owner and operator of LeVair Performance. Warren was well known across the country for building and racing the Corvair. He was an innovator in the Corvair performance world, so much so, that he wrote a book about his experiences. Warren was a member of the SCCA for over 50 years, winning multiple awards and campaigning through the auto crossing and amateur road racing worlds. He traveled extensively for Corvair conventions. You could easily spot his car by the Tweety Bird mascot.

Warren loved to make people smile and enjoyed playing the piano in nursing homes. He could always be found behind the piano at any social event.

Survivors include his wife of 57 years, Sharon Elaine Wilson LeVeque; children, W. Scott (Melinda) LeVeque, of Pulaski, Tennessee, Michael John (Tracy) LeVeque, of Fayetteville, and Michelle LeVeque (Chad) Werner, of Houston, Texas; grandchildren, Amanda LeVeque, Lauren LeVeque (Seth) Heseque, John (fiance, Christy Martin) LeVeque, Jacob LeVeque, Logan Gibson, Libby Gibson (Ryan) Leach and Nova Werner; great-grandchildren, Emelia Heseque and Fitz Leach; sister, Sheryl (John) Sommerkamp, of Carmel; niece, Paige Sommerkemp (Jeff) Hayes, of Camby; greatniece, Darby; and great-nephew, Chandler.

# Warren LeVeque Eulogy

Remembering Warren LeVeque, by James Rice

Warren LeVeque passed away this month. He was one of the greats who kept the candle lit for the Corvair hobby during the dark days when Corvairs were a dime a dozen. And he did it by racing them. The following is a eulogy for Warren, written by James Rice.

My friend of several decades Warren LeVeque has departed this life as we know it, and has entered eternal rest with his Savior. He will be missed by us all. I first met Warren and Sharon at Indianapolis Raceway part in 1978. I bummed a ride to the WOR Games, to watch the Yenko Stinger Challenge sponsored by Jim Schardt. Over the following years, we met at various Corvair and SCCA races, forming a friendship. In 1997, when I was given the opportunity and responsibility to get Jim Schardt's ex-Donna Mae Mimm's Yenko Stinger to the Monterey Historic Races in California, Warren was the first person I thought of as crew. We had a good week. He was a most interesting man. He was small in stature, but big in heart, enthusiasm and grit. He was well educated, but was a skilled trades working stiff, not given to lots of money. He once told me the overtime pay funded his racing. When it stopped, he stopped. Watching and listening to him in a group was to be enlightened. Whenever someone would say "I wonder if we could do this to make our cars faster." he often replied "I tried that. It doesn't help. I have the parts on my wall in my shop to prove it." But he also sometimes went "Hummm." and went home to his shop. He also served CORSA as the Chairman of the Competition Committee for many years, writing many entertaining and informative columns. He loved to give people rides in his race cars. One of the cheap thrills in my life was at the 2007 Detroit Convention's autocross when he gave me a ride in the ex-Bill Thomas/Doug Roe EM Corvair. What a historic Corvair race car! What a ride! I think Warren built 4 racecars from scratch, and restored or re-engineered a couple more. He was an excellent machinist and fabricator, and did some very interesting work. For all that he accomplished, I only heard him brag once. And it wasn't about his racing accomplishments, which were many. He once said he had lived more years than any male in the LeVeque family tree. He was proud of this, as he had several physical and health issues. But he persevered. But it was his health which finally kept him out of his racecars several years ago. He had a accident on the street because of his health condition, and Sharon said enough. And he listened. Good man Warren. To his wife Sharon, children Scott, Michelle and Michael, you have our condolences and prayers. May the God of all peace comfort you. We shed tears with you.


