



Historic Hastings Car Shows in 2021



Air Cleaner Turbulence

When I found out that my air cleaners, both Early and Late, were choking off my intake of air, not the paper, the Tin!, I started to ask around. Most people just said they used different kinds of air cleaners that have an individual stack of a filter material on top of each carb. I allowed that I had seen that in some CORSA pictures



but never paid much attention to that, as those were the highly motivated guys going for top placement. I was sort of upset that my factory unit was not giving me an OK deal. Then the guy who says he knows about this, agreed with my observation that the EM Tin is really bad (!), which is what I saw, I figured he might have some good suggestions.

He said to put a 4" piece of pipe on top of each carb to let the air smooth

out after it makes that corner, from the cleaner down into the throat of the carb. I said I could do that. Got some 2"


To hold these tall guys down on top of the carbs I had to make looonger "Fran Schmit Spring Loaded J-hooks" - 6 inches long! Turns out I had a nice piece

of iron wire that bent when heated and otherwise lent itself to fabrication. With the stacks and the 'Big-X" air cleaner mounted, I can grab the cleaner and shake the car and nothing moves. I think I'm ready to run a test at 6000+RPM and see if they allow the air to turn that corner - smartly! Stay tuned!

An OLD Tech Tip

It's pretty obvious how this would work, when moving an Early or an FC without the Power-Train installed.



I recently saw this neat idea, reprinted from 30 years ago, in the Corvan-Antics, and wondered about going around a corner. Of course, this is only for moving things around the shop, or yard, and a person would just skid the tires and there would be no bother. BUT, I thought, what if that old axle shaft they welded between those Yokes were made up of two threaded pipes with a greased coupler between. Let's say you build this and install it with the coupling "un-screwed" a turn or two. Now, when you move your dead vehicle the axles would thread together, or apart, depending on which rear wheel went the ahead of the other. I would think you'd have to do a lot of 'always turning the same way' before you'd have a problem. I checked on a piece of pipe and the threads are an 8 pitch. If you are moving your vehicle with this setup, and the wheels get a full turn out of whack, that only changes the wheel separation by 0.125"!



Here's how it looks, when you build one. Kinda like a dogbone! Regardless of which vehicle is being pushed around, don't forget to...Keep-On-CORVAIRing, *Fran*

An "OLD" story but one that needs repeating.



I was looking at the Tire-Pressure legend was why I took the picture. OK, here's the punch line: later on, after I resolved the TP issue I noticed something in the picture. Here's part of the Photo I took. See where it says 4911? That means the tire was manufactured in the 49th week of

2011. That brought me up short when I realized my tires were ten years OLD. I thought about that for a while and was showing the picture to someone when I looked a



little closer at the Photo in my hand. Take a look at what I saw! To the LEFT! The entire sidewall is checked with some serious cracking. This is why 10 years is considered to be "Time is up"
