CMI Meeting Minutes, August 8, 2023

I would like to sincerely apologize to Jim Becker for not including him in the last CMI Meeting Minutes. Jim Becker graciously led The Corsa convention in Wisconsin Dells.

The program was a report on the CORSA International Convention which was held the last week of June in Wisconsin Dells. The program was presented by Jim Becker with additional details provided by several other members that were in attendance. Members were encouraged to plan on attending the 2024 convention in Dayton Ohio.

President Tom Quinn called the meeting to order at 7:01 pm.

Vice President Gary Nelson did the tech session. He spoke about how alternators. A alternator is alternating current and it changes to 12v DC; Half the weight of a generator. He believes that Chrysler was the first to use a alternator. Most alternators on GM are the same on a Corvair except for the mounting.

If you want to get some more power. You could take the back off of a alternator and make it go from 37 amp to 45 amp. The 1 wire alternator is from a marine and aircraft. If you decide to take apart a alternator, it's a good idea to mark it in order for pieces to go exactly back the way they should be.

The nut where the positive cable goes is not metric, it's not American, so it is highly recommended that you don't lose it because finding a replacement is near impossible.

Activities Director Jim Brandberg spoke about boring plates, boring a cylinder you'd want to torque it down to 30 lbs. He showed off the full finned cylinder that only came with the 1960 and 1961.

Gary: You could bore a 1960 piston for a later car. The full finned is beveled. The full finned are meant to be a little more sturdy Paul, clothing sales are still good. We have pretty good balance.

We thought we might have someone to take over the Website.. it costs almost \$200 a year. Should we continue the website, there is information on there. We need to decide whether to keep it. They invited us to move up front but we actually drew a lot of interested folks to "the other side" just on our own merits. It was fun to see the old cars underway and they dropped some oil on the new asphalt with their open valvetrains and all. Reasonably priced hamburgers and bratwurst with good lawn chair visiting time. One tends to think of Buffalo being west of Plymouth but it's more like west of Rogers. West of Plymouth is more like Howard Lake. Similar to I-94, Highway 55 runs northwest, I suppose they key off of the Mississippi River. 
A Fuel Pump story



The other day my FC Fuel Pump (External Electric) began to leak. Investigation involved tearing it apart to find how it was built. The pump mechanism was clamped between two plastic end pieces that were also made to house the threaded fittings. Not a good idea, IMHO. Any cranking on the plastic housing puts stress on the ability of the system to hold two O-rings compressed. Didn't work. Placed An order to Clark's.




Just to be certain how things work, I figured I better find out what pressure the new pump will supply. I have a 0-10 psi gauge which I have used in the past but

sure, I thought I had better test the wanted it to read correctly about 5 up how much water head it takes and it says 11.5 feet. Now I read but then thought I was being silly need to know anything so close will matter.








of the door and down the stairs to the meter. Gauge reads zero psi when held at the top of the door, see pic with door in it. As I walked down the stairs the meter was level with the bottom of the 6.5' door so it read 2.8 psi and at the last step from the bottom read 5 psi at 11.5'. Good, the meter is







My Clark's order came quickly – about four days. Nice looking pump (all metal case) threaded on both ends, with a filter - to protect the Pump, not the Carburetor - looks like



this: Measured Pressure on this Pulsating Pump is 6.5 psi. I'm certain my carbs can handle that much pressure but I will check all my connections once it is installed. Goes right back on the



crossmember where its predecessor had been: level with the bottom of the tank. I left the old filter on as it looked OK. Had to put the filter at an angle to clear the shift tube coming through the 'holey' tank. Visible along the tank's edge is the tank's air vent necessitated by the plugged vent hole in the cap.

All systems are 'go'.


